- ★ "The Da Vinci Code" by Dan Brown
 - A fictional adventure about the lost blood lines of Christ and its connection to a secretive real-life cult that has many famous people in history as in its membership, past and present. - ★ "1984" by George Orwell
 - "1984" is a required reading for 12th graders.
